Thank you for your email.

The application map provided is what was submitted by the applicant, the public rights found (if any) may differ from what has been applied for. The council has a duty to investigate potential unrecorded public rights where evidence has been brought to the council's attention of those possible public rights.

I attach a map extract below which demonstrates the extent of the U/C road 7097 shaded blue. This is the extent of the road which is maintainable at the public expense.



Regarding future maintenance, if public rights are found in this case and a legal order is made and confirmed to record those rights the highway authority (Wiltshire Council), would be responsible for keeping that route maintained to a suitable condition for the public rights. For example, if public bridleway rights were recorded over the extent of Drove Lane northwest of your property, where currently there are no recorded public rights, then the council would be responsible for maintaining that route in a condition fit for bridleway use, i.e. public use on foot, bicycle and horseback, but not to the standard suitable for vehicular use.

The current process underway is to determine what public rights may exist over the route based on the historic documentary evidence of those rights and record those appropriately if found. The maintenance of those rights if recorded would become a matter for Wiltshire Councils Countryside Access Officers for the area where those rights would be recorded in the definitive map and statement for the area.

I hope the above is of assistance but if you have further queries, please let me know.

Thank you for your letter ref D/2020/10 dated 29 August 24 received 2 September 24.

My wife and I live in Homestead Farm on Drove Lane.

We query the 'application route' definition on the plan, and in particular point B which is shown to be approximately midway on Drove Lane along the length of the Elisha Fields car park. We believe this point B should be where the tarmac ends on Drove Lane, nearer to Kings Road adjacent to Bowyer's yard.

When we purchased Homestead Farm in 2007, we were led to believe that the unmetalled length of Drove Lane was a permissive footpath, owned to the middle of it's width by the landowners either side. We note that it has been used since 2007 by walkers, pedal cyclists and occasional horse riders, and have no objection to this continuing use. Residents of the unmetalled portion of Drove Lane also access their houses by car and foot.

Our concession as above to it's use has occasionally been abused by speeding motor cyclists, to which we have considerable objection on the grounds of safety and nuisance. We would similarly have many objections to it's public use by motorised vehicles, which would make it a rat run to bypass the congested Market Lavington High Street. We note however that the application is only that it be designated as a bridleway, and have concern about the maintenance liability of this potential change, as the application doesn't make the responsibility for this clear.

Thank you for your email dated 29 August 2024 re. the application to record bridleway rights over part of Drove Lane, SN10 4NT.

The application route consists of private track/road owned by each relevant property and/or landowner (frontager) to its centre line (ad medium filum). The frontagers of the application route maintain this private track/road to enable them access to their properties and land. The private track/road is gated at least annually for resurfacing and repairs, organised and funded by the frontagers. For example, in 2023 the Kings Road end of the application route was gated for 72 hours while approximately 120 tons of aggregate and road planings were laid at the expense of the relevant frontagers. The Elisha Field end of the application route is closed at least annually by the frontagers for essential repairs and maintenance.

Importantly, the application route is clearly signed "Private Road" at the Elisha Field end and is clearly signed "No Through Road" at the Kings Road end. This signage has been in place for many years, certainly since we moved to the village in 2009 and frontagers pre-dating us can witness the existence of the signage for many years before this. Market Lavington Parish Council corroborated this in 2023 in their Parish Magazine.

Any use of this private track/road by walkers, cyclists, riders or others is trespass as there are permanent interruptions to the use of the application route by the clear signage in place. Residents and landowners of the application route have also verbally challenged horse riders on occasions where they may have attempted to use this private track/road over the years.

The "Summary of evidence" submitted by the applicant all appears to be either inconclusive or support that the part of Drove Lane in question is indeed private and does not provide bridleway rights.

However, for the sake of completeness of this objection I will comment on the last four items of evidence.

- 1) 1910 Finance Act Record Plan Wiltshire Sheet XL.14 "The application route is a white road". White roads were omitted from Finance Act valuations therefore the term "white road" provides no evidence whatsoever that there are, or have ever existed, bridleway rights over the application route. Indeed, this evidence is contrary to the application as the 1910 Finance Act provided intricate levels of detail over the status of roads and tracks, with landowners receiving tax relief if a public right of way crossed their land. If the application route had bridleway rights this would have been called out clearly in the Wiltshire Record Plan XL.14.
- 2) MAF Survey 1941-43 the applicant themselves explains why the MAF Survey is not evidence of bridleway rights as they state that "unproductive land such as Roads, Water or Woods was excluded from the survey". The Kings Road end of the application route is heavily wooded. The applicant then concludes with apparently no further evidence "suggesting this was considered a Road". If this was the case, and there is no evidence to support this, it would be a private track/road with no bridleway rights.
- 3) Ordnance Survey Sheet SU05 B, 1958 as in (2) above, the applicant themselves writes that the application route does not have bridleway rights. The application route is shown as fenced "Other roads" if it was a bridleway or had bridleway rights it would be classed as a "Bridle Road" and if it was not private (as it is) it would be classed as "Roads, Ministry of Transport Class [x].
- 4) Land Registry 2020 this is correct, the application route is a narrow strip of unregistered land. As described above, ad medium filum applies to this narrow strip of unregistered land with the application route a private track/road owned by each relevant frontager to its centre line. There are permanent interruptions to the use of this private track/road by the public as described above.

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#### 9. Ordnance Survey 25" Wiltshire Sheet XL.14 Second Edition

#### a. <u>Date.</u>

The Second Edition of OS Sheet Wiltshire XL.14 was revised in 1899 and published in 1900.

#### b. Relevance.


The OS County Series 25 inch mapping was predominantly used for professional purposes rather than for navigation. They are detailed enough to show gates/barriers on roads, tracks and paths. Parcels of land are numbered and areas are shown either under the parcel number of in separate "Area Books" (on some First Edition sheets). Second edition and later maps generally carry the disclaimer "The representation on this map of a Road, Track or (Foot)path is no evidence of the existence of a right of way". However, scrutiny of some of the detail contained along with contemporary published guidance allows some inferences as to status of routes to be drawn. Additionally, on the first edition only, colour was used on some sheets to give significance to certain features (roads, buildings, water features, etc.)

#### c. Archive. WSHC OS25inch sheets

#### d. Meaning.

Sheet XL.14 is uncoloured.

The application route is the western part of a fenced, uncoloured strip of land, numbered (189) and measured (2.335) separately from the land adjoining it. It is not labelled F.P. nor B.R.



#### e. Assessment.

This is evidence of the existence of the application route in 1899.

That the land of which the application route is part is separately numbered and measured suggests it was not considered part of the land on either side and suggests it was a public road:

"It was the practice of the OS to allocate parcel numbers to distinct pieces of land and number them. These are numbered and recorded on the maps as acreages. Where applicable parcels were braced with adjoining parcels – for example, a track across a field may be braced in with the surrounding land and measured with that. However, some features 'are always separately numbered and measured irrespective of their size. They include railways in rural areas (in built up areas they may form part of the 'Town area'), all public roads, whether fenced or unfenced and foreshore and tidal water.'". From Ordnance Survey Maps, a descriptive manual by J B Harley (published by the Ordnance Survey in 1975).

It is not conclusive of vehicular rights that the route is neither labelled "F.P" nor "B.R" but suggestive of them.

As the application route is shown connecting to another clearly depicted route the applicant concludes that the application route was part of the local public road network.

Besides its value as evidence supportive of the application this map also supports other evidence. A road discussed in the 1906 Devizes RDC Sanitary and Roads Committee is referred to in them as being numbered 189, and the application route is the western end of land parcel 189. Additionally, the Devizes RDC Register of Rights of Way under the 1932 Act describes Cemetery Lane as running from New Road to the Cemetery and thence to the Lavington – Urchfont Road. That cemetery is shown on this map adjacent to land parcel 189.

If Land Parcel 189 was considered to be private then the RDC would certainly have said so, and would not have inspected it.

The Summons and the response by the RDC both clearly suggest that land parcel 189 i.e. the entire length of what is in 2024 named Drove Lane, was a public road.

The land parcel numbered 189 on the Ordnance Survey map (OS 25inch Wiltshire Sheet XL.14 Second Edition (published 1900)) is Drove Lane, known in 1906 (as shown by these minutes) as Cemetry (sic) Lane.

An extract of OS 25inch Wiltshire Sheet XL.14 Second Edition (published 1900) showing land parcel 189 is amongst the evidence adduced for this application.

The Summons refers to land parcel 189 as a "road" and the minutes refer to having inspected "Road "B" and 'this road being known as Cemetery Lane".

If Land Parcel 189 was considered to be private then the RDC would certainly have said so and would not have inspected it.

That the Committee inspected Cemetry Lane at all indicates they considered it a public highway; they refer to it throughout as a road, and nothing suggests they were ever interested in only part of the road.

The Summons and the response by the RDC both clearly suggest that land parcel 189 i.e. the entire length of what is in 2024 named Drove Lane, was a public road.

Because in 1906 responsibility for maintenance of highways rested with the RDC, with that responsibility managed by the Roads and Sanitary Committee, these minutes are strong evidence that in 1906 the whole length of Cemetry Lane was a public vehicular highway, or at least a public bridleway.

In 1914 responsibility for the maintenance of highways rested with the Rural District Councils.

- c. Archives. WSHC, Ref. G5/113/4
- d. Meaning.

An entry appears in the minutes of the Devizes RDC Sanitary and Roads Committee minutes for 1st April 1914, concerning Cemetery Lane. Cemetery Lane was renamed as Drove Lane in the 1950s. An extract of the Wiltshire Highway Record map with the application route which runs along the western end of Drove Lane annotated "CEMETERY LANE" has been submitted as part of the evidence for this application.

The entry, which runs over two pages, reads as follows (irrelevant wording omitted):

#### "Market Lavington

A letter from the Market Lavington Parish Council was read that the following matters were before the above council at their Annual Parish Meeting

The very bad state of

- 1. The footpath leading towards West Lavington across the Clay especially the portion across the Recreation Ground.
- 2. The top portion of Cemetry Lane near "Crossways", and
- *3*. .....

As the Parish Council was unable to deal with these matters it was unanimously resolved to refer them to the Rural District Council

The Surveyor in answer to the Chairman reported as to no. 1. ..........

As to no. 2. The reason why the top portion of Cemetery Lane was in a bad condition was owing to the long spell of wet weather

#### e. <u>Assessment.</u>

The Wiltshire Council Rights of Way Explorer map makes it highly likely that 'near Crossways" refers to the western end of Cemetery Lane i.e. the application route..

These minutes make it clear that 1) the Parish Council considered that the RDC were responsible for the maintenance of the top portion of Cemetery Lane, and 2) that, by instructing the Surveyor to attend to the problem, the RDC accepted that that was the case.

These minutes are good evidence that both Market Lavington Parish Council and Devizes Rural District Council considered, in 1914, that the top portion of Cemetery Lane (i.e. the application route) was a public highway, maintainable by the RDC.
